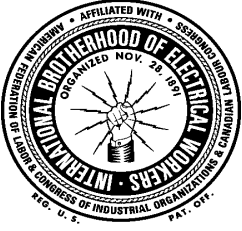

The wheat straw pulp mill in Starbuck is still unknown at this time. This is a grass roots project currently looking for investors.

Organizing Report

Upholding the IBEW Constitution
"To Organize All Workers In The
Entire Electrical Industry"

I will be retiring in July and want to thank all of you for your friendship and support. I would like to leave you with the following thoughts.

Many times I have talked to non- union workers who are my age and they told me they have no pension, no savings and no insurance. Some have even lost their jobs due to their age. Most say they wished they would have been in the union earlier in life. In my latest position as an Organizer for Local 112, I feel I have been able to help people get into our Local and enjoy the benefits of being an IBEW member. It is a great feeling to know you've helped a person get started towards a better standard of living.

While working in Local 112, I have always enjoyed steady employment, a good wage and good working conditions. These are things our past members worked hard to secure for our generation of workers in the IBEW. With the current political climate and anti-union attitude many people have today, it is going to be hard for our union members and their leadership to maintain these high standards. I feel the best way is to control the manpower. If a contractor can get a qualified Electrician for \$25 per hour, why be a union contractor and pay \$60 per hour? We must control the manpower so they need us to supply a qualified workforce.

I have always thought the best way to learn our trade is by going through an IBEW apprenticeship, but there are a lot of good electricians who have learned the trade in other ways. Trade schools, military training and non- union apprenticeship programs, to name a few. We need to bring these qualified workers into our membership. Local 112 has set long term organizing goals and the membership must work to obtain them.

The blitzes are an excellent opportunity to meet and talk with the non-union in our jurisdiction and share your thoughts with them on being a union electrician. Local 112's next blitz will be held on September 6th & 7th, so please think about participating this year. Hot Weather Safety Tips for Construction

OSHA recommends the following tips while working in hot summer temps.

Hydrate—water & electrolytic beverages such as Gatorade, Squincher, etc. are good. Avoid designer beverages, soda, caffeine and sugary drinks.

Clothing: Wear light colored cotton clothing or the engineered fabrics that provide a cooling effect.

Look out for one another ! Early signs of heat illness include lethargy, disorientation, stumbling, dropping tools and slurred speech !

IBEW ENDORSES HILLARY CLINTON FOR PRESIDENT

Int’l. President Lonnie R. Stephenson issued the following statement:

“The choice America faces this November is now clear. As Senator, Hillary Clinton has stood with us and the labor movement more than 90% of the time, from opposing right-to-work laws to supporting federal project labor agreements. Secretary Clinton has vowed to invest in our industrial and energy infrastructure and push for stronger enforcement of labor law, including cracking down on wage theft that is all too common in the construction industry.
