SAFETY SPOT

Electricity is dangerous at any work site, but at construction sites, it's particularly dangerous. This is true for several reasons. There are a lot of different workers on the site who don't know one another and who are not familiar with each other's systems and protocols. Many structures and installations and hook-ups are temporary and may change as the project continues. The electricity on construction sites is often at a higher voltage than normal household voltage.

It is worthwhile for every construction worker to become familiar with basic guidelines for avoiding electrical accidents on the worksite. Many workers have found a nasty electrical surprise when they reach into boxes or other enclosures whose contents are not visible. Don't reach blindly into areas that may contain wiring or energized parts. Find out what is inside any enclosed area before reaching into it or probing it with a metal tool. Such areas should be protected, but especially during construction, they may not be.

Trips and falls may not always be as life threatening as electric shocks, but they can have serious effects and they are probably the most common hazard associated with extension cords. Try to avoid letting extension cords cross aisles or other areas where pedestrians can trip over them.

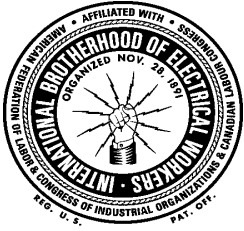

CREM and Townsend Electric at PCA at Wallula have both started laying off night shifts and days will lay off as completion goals are hit. PDX 63 is still unknown as to which contractor got the bid and PDX 80 has slowed until this fall. PDX 58/61 and PDX 62 are also fully staffed and moving forward. JH Kelly has a few and we should see them start to ramp up by June/July of this year with completion date set for April of 2019. Starbuck pulp mill has seen some hiring recently, with more to come in July through the end of the year. They are projected to have a total around 35. Power City is the electrical contractor on this job. WTCC had a layoff recently, eliminating night shift. The LAW has reached some milestones, but there is still work to be done. Williams Plant Services has been calling for people to perform work at the Columbia Generating Station and 2019 is an outage year for them as well. Book I- 43 Book II- 128

NEGOTIATIONS

A 3 year contract was ratified by the membership on May 12, 2018 and will come into effect on June 1, 2018. We are currently working out the details in order to implement everything by June 1st. We will be printing the small booklet agreements this year and will get them out in the field when we receive them.

Organizing Report

At the 9th District Progress meeting we recently attended in Alaska, IBEW President Lonnie Stephenson spoke on the Code of Excellence and stated that 60% of Americans support Unions and an even higher percentage for people 35 and younger. Approximately 275 delegates attend the 9th District Progress Meeting each year. To go along with this statement, we've noticed an uptick in participation from our membership and would like to see this trend continue. It was also reported that we have 37% market share in the 9th District and that we need to guard against members dropping out of the IBEW.

Local 112 was 1 of 9 locals within the 9th District to win the Henry Miller Award. This award is given to locals for their commitment to Organizing.
